ARH worker shares story to help others

Gail Maurer will be sharing her personal story of an unexpected heart attack at the 4th Annual **Bubbly Breakfast** on Feb. 5, 2016 at Sevenoaks Shopping Centre. The event is a fundraiser for the FVHCF supporting cardiac care at Abbotsford Regional Hospital (ARH).

Maurer is an assistant in Medical Administration at ARH. She has worked for Fraser Health for 18 years. She became involved with the Foundation through work:

"We worked together on Grand Rounds, a weekly medical education session for staff. That was my initial contact with the Foundation," said Maurer. She has since attended fundraising events presented by FVHCF.

"On Saturday, May 2 – just a normal day – my husband and I were attending a fundraising event. I went in feeling fine. I was up dancing, and all of a sudden, it was like somebody flicked a switch and I didn't feel fine anymore."

Maurer excused herself, sat down,

continued to feel unwell, and went home in denial of the possibility of a heart attack in progress.

"It was 4 am and I hadn't slept at all. At that point, I flipped open my phone, and I typed in 'symptoms of a heart attack.' A checklist popped up, and I had every symptom on the list. By 7 am, I presented to ARH Emergency, where they did indeed confirm that I was having a heart attack."


Maurer learned some important health variables, or risk factors, for heart attack.

"50% of my risk comes from family genes. I also learned that diet plays a big part. One of my risk factors is blood pressure: I have to limit my salt intake. I can do something about exercise, and stress levels," Maurer said.

She is happy to speak at the Bubbly Breakfast so that others can learn from her close call. She will speak on her experience and the care she received at the cardiology unit at ARH.

This past November, three of us from the Abbotsford Breast Health Centre journeyed to Minnesota by air to attend a big three-day Mayo Clinic breast health conference. The three of us: myself, Crystal Letkeman RN, along with Geralyn Hogan RN and Coreen Dyck general surgeon, flew out on November 11 to attend all the sessions offered.

Each day started early and continued on until dinner time with sessions from many specialities. Thank goodness there was always coffee provided to keep our brains awake and stimulated!

With about 40 sessions, there was a lot to take in.

We had sessions ranging from new studies and techniques in breast imaging, chemotherapy and radiation treatments. We heard about benign biopsies and what they can indicate as far as treatments and follow ups required.

Some of the less common ages/ profiles of patients to assess and treat were discussed, such as men, young women, pregnant women and the elderly. We learned more about how to accurately assess, treat and follow up on nipple discharge, as well as

The Run for Mom will fundraise for a fetal monitor for Chilliwack General Hospital's maternity unit at the May 7 10K-5K-1K run/walk.

Fetal monitors measure the vital signs of both baby and mother, detecting heart rate, uterine activity, fetal movement and help reduce complications. A new one is approximately \$30,000. It is needed to replace aging equipment at CGH.

Since 2000, RFM has raised over \$385,000 for equipment such as infant resuscitators, delivery beds, jaundice meters, glidescopes and more.
